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The substance of the present volume, comprising the contributions of authors from 16 countries (*Republic of Azerbaijan, Bulgaria, France, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Italy, Republic of Macedonia, Republic of Moldova, Poland, Romania, the Russian Federation, Serbia, Turkey, the United States of America, and the Republic of Uzbekistan*)—a sign of appreciation for the scientific work and the personality of the distinguished Romanian scholar Tasin Gemil (of Tatar origin, born in Dobrudja)—consists of thematic areas which have been familiar, and they are still, to the distinguished septuagenarian.

The 63 authors (fifty-nine studies), from scientific specialists, acknowledged in the academia and research world in their respective countries, to young Romanian Ph.D. students, have addressed issues which editors have divided, chronologically, into four thematic parts and *Varia*—Part One: *Central Asia. The Middle East*; Part Two: *Crimea. The Tatars*; Part Three: *The Ottoman Empire/Turkey. The Balkans*; Part Four: *The Romanian Principalities. Dobrudja*; and Part Five: *Varia*. There are various topics that are part of the main research areas of the authors—materialized in valuable books and studies rated as such by their colleagues in their time—, so that the scientific substance of these contributions undoubtedly confers value to this volume.

As the reader will observe, there are thoroughly documented studies—many of them unpublished documents introduced into scientific circulation—with an updated bibliography, on which the authors formulate relevant and authorized scientific observations and conclusions.

"We believe that *Turkology* encompasses not only the history, language, culture, and civilization, as an ensemble and particularly (for each people and community) of the Turkic world, but also the geography, economy, geopolitics, state structure, and past and present politics of this consistent part of humankind. Despondently, there is still a plethora of clichés, misconceptions, and unfounded conclusions regarding the Turkic peoples, all coming from the depths of history. We believe that a correct and deeper knowledge of this world, of its connections with other peoples and states, is meant to provide a more realistic perspective on the current and future cooperation with all the peoples and communities of the Turkic world."
